
OVERVIEW

On March 27, 28, and 29, 2023, over 400 international participants gathered in Kansas City, Missouri, for the 2nd Annual Construction Working Minds Summit. This summit was hosted by the Construction Industry Alliance for Suicide Prevention and United Suicide Survivors International. The theme of the conference was "BUILDING OUT THE MENTAL HEALTH MOVEMENT -- MOVING FROM AWARENESS TO IMPACT IN MENTAL HEALTH AND SUICIDE PREVENTION".



Mr. Doug Parker, the Assistant Secretary of the US Department of Labor, was the next keynote speaker. Mr. Parker reiterated that mental health is a priority for the Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA).

In the spirit of "Moving from Awareness to Impact," conference attendees committed to action and engaged in several structured and facilitated conversations on how to shift culture, build better and more accessible supports, and improve skills to help oneself and help others who may be experiencing mental health challenges. For instance, the conference opened with some anonymous and confidential polling asking people "what does mental health mean to you" and engaging them in the thought process of treating mental health like physical health.

Surprise Announcement

While the conference was in session, the FDA approved the first over-the-counter naloxone nasal spray. A huge victory in harm reduction in the nation's ongoing opioid crisis. The construction industry continues to be hit hard by the opioid crisis due to a high rate of musculoskeletal injuries resulting in prescription pain management and surgeries. Summit co-chair Cal Beyer, Vice President, Workforce Risk and Worker Wellbeing from Holmes Murphy, moderated a panel on Opioid First Dose Prevention Strategies with panelists from Goldfinch Health, national occupational medical clinic WorkSTEPS, and national nonprofit SAFE project (Stop the Addiction Fatality Epidemic).



How have suicide, substance abuse or mental health issues shown up in your life? I've been close to someone who was fighting suicidal 23% thoughts, addictions, or mental health challenges **Experienced mental health problems** 22% depression, anxiety, etc.) or significant distress. I've been impacted by a suicide death of someone 15% who was not a loved one/co-worker. I've lost a loved one to suicide 13% (friend or family member) 9% I've thought about suicide or attempted suicide. 9% I've lost a co-worker to suicide. I've lived with/recovered from a substance 7% use problem (alcohol, drugs). Suicide, addictions or mental health issues have not shown up in my life

This year the Construction Working Minds Summit extended an open "call for awards" submission to highlight the excellent work organizations and individuals have been doing in the space of mental health promotion, suicide prevention, and addiction recovery in construction. 



CONCLUSION

The 2nd Annual Construction Working Minds Summit expanded the foundational work of mental health in construction in several ways:

- **1** The scope of the conference doubled from 200 attendees to 400.
- 2 Construction students and apprentices were engaged and supported through scholarships.
- 3 The content of the conference expanded from just mental health and suicide prevention to also include addiction recovery and overdose prevention.
- **4** Key policy leaders and additional stakeholders were enrolled to be part of the dialogue on solutions.
- Insights related to hot topics and future directions were gathered in roundtable discussions to inform the development of a future white paper.
